C. MONOLOGUE SCRIPT

Hello everyone! Have you heard about the latest health issue? When a certain disease or outbreak becomes a hot issue then I might emerge. Yes, I am sure you are familiar with me. I am a pandemic. I am defined as the "worldwide spread of a new disease". The World Health Organization declares the emergence of me. Do you know how I can occur?

I cannot be declared as soon as an outbreak happens. There are some stages to ensure that I exist. I am always preceded by the circulation of a virus among an animal population. This is not considered a threat. However, after this, the virus in the animal population can then transmit to human beings. This signals a potential risk because the virus has jumped to humans. In the next stage, transmission of the virus begins in small clusters of human beings through human-to-human transmission. Community outbreaks happen through human-to-human transmission. At this time,

there is a risk that I will emerge. When a virus has transmitted to at least two countries within the WHO regions, people consider that I am inevitable. This signals that I am imminent. I do occur when there are community level outbreaks in multiple countries or continents.

I am generally classified as an epidemic first, which is the rapid spread of a disease across a particular region or regions, but an epidemic does not necessarily become me. I am not defined by a growth rate but rather by the spread of the disease over regions. When there is a worldwide spread, you will see me across the whole globe. It is important that you contribute to slow down the spread of the disease.

Transmission of the virus begins in small clusters of human beings through human-to-human transmission. A pandemic is generally classified as an epidemic first. A pandemic is not defined by a growth rate but rather by the spread of the disease over regions. When there is a worldwide spread, a pandemic is declared.

2. Answers may vary


